1.0 SITE DESCRIPTION AND PROPOSAL

- 1.1 The application site relates to 39 Yew Tree Way, a mid-terraced property located on a housing estate in Churchdown (site plan attached).
- 1.2 The proposal is for a single storey front extension to create additional living accommodation (plans attached).
- 1.3 A committee determination is required as the Parish Council are objecting to the proposal on the grounds that this extension would set a precedent as it would greatly change the street scene of Yew Tree Way.

5.1 The application has been publicised through the posting of a site notice for a period of 21 days.

5.2 No responses have been received from local residents.

6.0 POLICY CONTEXT

6.1 Section 38(6) of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 requires that proposals be determined in accordance with the development plan unless material considerations indicate otherwise. Section 70 (2) of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 provides

that the Local Planning Authority shall have regard to the provisions of the Development Plan, so far as material to the application, and to any other material considerations.

- 6.2** The Development Plan currently comprises the Joint Core Strategy (JCS) (2017), saved policies of the Tewkesbury Borough Local Plan to 2011 (March 2006) (TBLP), and a number of 'made' Neighbourhood Development Plans.
- 6.3** The Tewkesbury Borough Plan (TBP) has reached an advanced stage. The Examination in Public was held in February/March 2021 and the Inspector's post hearings Main Modifications letter was received on 16 June 2021. In this letter the Inspector provided his current view as to what modifications are required to make the Plan 'sound'. Those policies in the Pre-submission version of the TBP which are not listed as requiring main modifications may now attract more weight in the consideration of applications, with those policies which do in the Inspector's view require main modifications attracting less weight depending on the extent of the changes required. The TBP remains an emerging plan and the weight that may be attributed to individual policies will still be subject to the extent to which there are unresolved objections (the less significant the unresolved objections, the greater the weight that may be given) and the degree of consistency with the NPPF (the closer the policies to those in the NPPF the greater the weight that may be given).
- 6.4** The relevant policies are set out in the appropriate sections of this report.
- 6.5** Other material policy considerations include national planning guidance contained within the National Planning Policy Framework 2019 and the Tewkesbury Borough Plan 2011-2031 Pre-Submission Version (October 2019).

7.0 ANALYSIS

Design and Visual Amenity

- 7.1** JCS Policy SD4 of the Joint Core Strategy sets out requirements for high quality design while Local Plan Policy HOU8 provides that development must respect the character, scale and proportion of the existing dwelling and the surrounding development.
- 7.2** The Parish Council have objected on the grounds that the proposed extensions would set a precedent as it would greatly change the street scene of Yew Tree Way.
- 7.3** The Parish Council's concerns have been noted, however, there are other similar sized / designed front extensions on this housing estate, for example, at 80 Yew Tree Way (18/01183/FUL), 42 Grove Road (18/00921/FUL) and 1 Oakhurst Close (00/8963/0171/FUL) all of which are in close proximity to the application site (see photographs). A virtually identical extension was also granted permission at this site back in 2003 (03/01149/FUL) but never built.
- 7.4** Overall, it is considered that the proposal would be of an appropriate size and design in keeping with the character and appearance of the property. Therefore, the proposal would have an acceptable impact on the character of the existing street scene and would comply with the requirements of Policy HOU8 of the Local Plan and Policy SD4 of the JCS.

Effect on the Living Conditions of Neighbouring Dwellings

- 7.5** Policy SD14 of the JCS requires that new development must cause no harm to local amenity including the amenity of neighbouring occupants. Local Plan Policy HOU8

provides that extensions to existing dwellings should not have an unacceptable impact on adjacent property and residential amenity.

- 7.6** The impact of the proposal upon neighbouring properties has carefully been assessed and it is considered that there would not be an undue impact upon their amenity in accordance with Policy HOU8 of the Local Plan and Policy SD14 of the JCS. No objections have been received from any of the neighbouring dwellings.

8.0 CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATION

- 8.1** It is considered that the proposal would not be unduly harmful to the appearance of the existing dwelling nor the surrounding area and it would not result in an unacceptable loss of residential amenity to neighbouring dwellings. The proposal would also be of an acceptable size and design. It would therefore accord with relevant policies as outlined above. Therefore, it is recommended the application be **permitted**.

CONDITIONS:

1. The works hereby permitted shall be begun before the expiration of five years from the date of this consent

Reason: Required to be imposed by Section 91 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 as amended by Section 51 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004

2. The development hereby permitted shall be carried out in accordance with the following documents:

Site plan & block plan dated 29th March 2021 and proposed elevations / floor plans dated 14th May 2021 except where these may be modified by any other conditions attached to this permission

Reason: To ensure that the development is carried out in accordance with the approved plans.

3. The materials to be used in the construction of the external surfaces of the proposed development shall match those used in the existing dwelling.

Reason: To ensure that the proposed development is in keeping with the existing dwelling.
